


















Shooting Sports Leader Information

VIP Training

VIP or Volunteers in Preparation training is for anyone who wants to work with youth one-on-one and teach sessions like a project or club leader. If you have signed up to volunteer in 4-H Online and I have yet to approve you, it is because of this: You must complete either VIP (in-person Training), mandated reporter training (Online), or Title IX Training (Online).

I will shift towards less pre-scheduled VIP training and more to working with your schedule. I am also willing to come to club meetings and train adults there! Please contact me if you are interested in scheduling a VIP training!

The mandated reporter is an online course in 4-H Online that you can complete over time. VIP, however, has to be taught by either myself or another educator virtually or in person. This training covers topics like creating a safe environment for youth, insurance, what to do in an emergency, and more. It takes about 90 minutes. I prefer to do VIP training on weeknights in September-May because the rest of the year gets pretty busy for everyone, especially in the summer. Want more information about VIPs? E-mail me! What are Charters?

Charters are an annual report that club leaders fill out detailing the club's SMART Goals, Annual activities, high-risk activities, and meeting times and locations. This form may seem like a silly task but it is essential. I use this information to update our website with current club leaders and meeting locations. This process is important because it gives a club or group permission from the state to use the 4-H name and emblem.

This process has been updated in the past couple of years and is now available online! It is also something that can be filled out during a club meeting. Giving members a chance to create club-wide goals and talk about activities they want to participate in during the year is a great way to lighten the load of a club leader and give youth officers/members a leadership opportunity.

Charters are always released on August 1st and due to me on **November 1st**. This document can be submitted to the office as a paper copy or emailed electronically.

I have sessions in the fall to help club leaders complete their charters and ask questions. I have had low attendance the past couple of years, if this is something you are interested in please reach out to me.

American Spirit:

Who can go: youth in grades 8-10

Cost \$1,900

Youth get to experience historical sights on the East Coast firsthand! This 10-day bus journey will stop at some amazing places like Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, New York, New York, Boston, Massachusetts, and Niagara Falls Canada!



Citizenship Washington Focus:

Who can go: 4-H Members in 10-12th grades Minimum age 15 during the experience

Cost\$1750

Citizen Washington Focus or CWF is a great opportunity for youth who want to experience our national government in action. Youth from all over the nation come together in Washington D.C. to learn more about our Senators and representatives and how they come together to make laws. They will also participate in workshops about citizenship, Congressional Issues, Bill writing, and Action Planning.



National 4-H Conference

Who can go: 8-10 4-H youth in 10-12th grade.

Cost \$1,500

This Educational experience included selected youth from the nation who came together in Washington D.C. to help strengthen the national 4-H program. Ideas that come from this program are shared with the U.S. Secretary of Agriculture after each conference.

Space Camp

Who can go: 6-8th Grades with a Maximum age of 15 at the time of the trip. Cost \$900

This educational Experience is out of this world! Participants get to experience a simulated Space Mission, building and launching their own rocket, accommodations simulating real space training experience, and learning all about space exploration and astronaut life.

Summer Academy

Who can go: 7-up Grades

Cost \$350

Formally Wisconsin Youth Conference, this educational experience is held at UW-Madison during June. The difference between this and the youth conference is the focus on post-secondary education. Youth pick one of 7 tracks to explore during the experience like Agriculture & and animal sciences, Art and communication, Culinary and Health, Human Services, Leadership and civic Engagement, Trades, and STEM(Science, Technology, Engineering, and math).







Travel Abroad

Who can go: Age 12-18 depending on the country.

The cost depends on the program.

Youth can experience different countries and cultures. Here are some of the places you can explore, Costa Rica, Japan (4-8 weeks), South Korea, and Taiwan. Counties are on a rotating cycle and change every couple of years.

Art Beat

Who can go: 3-5th Grades, parents welcome Cost \$125 for youth, \$75 for Chaperones

4-H Art Beat is the introductory program for Wisconsin 4-H Communication Arts and was created for 4-H members in grades 3-5, their parents, and leaders. Art Beat! provides an opportunity for youth and their parents to experience five different art forms in a camping environment at Camp Upham Woods in Wisconsin Dells. Art Beat! track leaders are older 4-H Youth, 4-H Leaders, and staff.

Arts Camp

Who can go: 6-8th Grades

Cost \$100 Youth \$55 Chaperones

4-H Arts Camp provides youth in grades 6-8 an opportunity to explore different types of art including theater, music, visual arts, dance, and photography while making new friends, developing skills, and enjoying new experiences.

The purpose of Arts Camp:

- Encouraging expression and participation in the arts with middle school-age youth
- Supporting youth teaching opportunities where they learn to incorporate education, creativity, and reflection into the creative process
- Increasing awareness of the arts and participation in the arts at the club level

Fall Forum

Who can go: 7-13th Grade and adult chaperones. The cost depends on how you spend the night and how many meals you will eat.

2024 Conservation Speech Contest Guidelines



State Contest – Wednesday, March 6th, 2024 at KI Center, Green Bay, WI



Contest Division

- Elementary Division... (3-5 minute speeches required).......Students enrolled in grades 5-6.
 Junior Division....... (4-6 minute speeches required).......Students enrolled in grades 7-8.
 Senior Division....... (5-7 minute speeches, required).......Students enrolled in grades 9-12.
- Subject Matter

Speeches must promote the conservation of natural resources and the protection or enhancement of environmental quality. Topics should address soil and water conservation issues. Emphasis should be placed on the subject as it relates to your locality or to the state of Wisconsin.

Authenticity and accuracy of information is important, and the speaker should demonstrate familiarity with the subject matter. Feel free to contact Natural Resource professionals as they can provide knowledge on numerous topics. The internet is a rich resource, however not all internet sources are reliable. When using the internet consider your source.

All speeches should be backed up by facts. Both sides of an issue should be presented in a fair and non-accusatory manner. Using names of people or businesses for slander will not be accepted and shall result in disqualification.

Visual Aids

Use of visual aids (posters, charts, etc.) is prohibited; however, notes may be used.

Speeche

A speech, in part or whole, used in this contest in previous years may not be used again. However, speeches used for other speaking events may be used. Group presentations are not allowed.

County Contest

An individual student may only enter in one County level speech contest, either in the County in which they reside or in the county in which they attend school. If the County an individual lives in does not host a speaking contest, the individual may seek permission from another County to enter their contest. The winners of each division in each County may compete in the Area Association contests.

Students must compete in a County and/or Area contest to qualify for the state contest. All contest entry forms must be signed by a parent or guardian.

Area Contest

Local County winner will advance to their area contest. Please view our website for your area contest dates, https://wisconsinlandwater.org/our-work/youth-education/poster-speaking-contest. The results of the Area contest (including the parental/guardian signature, legible names, addresses and counties of residence of the winners) shall be sent by the Area contest coordinator to all County contest coordinators immediately following the contest for State contest set-up and publicity purposes.

The Area association committees and coordinators are responsible for arranging the participation of its three winning speakers (1st place in each division) in the state contest.

Contest Scheduling

County and Area Association contests should be completed by Wednesday, February 7, 2024.

State Contest

State contest entry forms for each area contest winner must be received at the WI Land+Water office no later than Wednesday, February 7, **2024**. The state contest will be held in the morning of Wednesday, March 6, 2024, at KI Center, Green Bay, Wisconsin. Registration will be from 9:00 am-9:30 am. First-place winners in each division are invited to present their winning • speeches at the 2024 WI Land+Water Annual Conference Luncheon that same day at **11:00 a.m.**

State contest RSVP must be completed by **Friday**.

to come in the night before and wish to book a hotel room. Plase contact the KI Center directly and mention WI Land+Water Annual Conference to receive the state rate at the KI Center.
