

Fall Club Visits

- Bylaw Review
 - Time: 2 hours
 - Youth leaders review the current club bylaws and help shape them to the current needs of the club.

 - Officer training for new and current officers. This can happen before a club meeting. Topics covered would be job responsibilities, parliamentary procedure, and how to run a meeting.

 - These activities can take as much time as you want. I will bring activities that can be added to any meeting to help club members get to know other club members.
- Team Building
 - Time: 20 minutes 1 hour
 - These activities can help your officer team build better connections and work together. The whole club can participate too!

Charter Applications are now Open

The 4-H Charter indicates that a 4-H Club or Group is organized by the objectives of the Wisconsin 4-H program. The University of Wisconsin-Madison, Division of Extension grants 4-H Charters which formally authorizes a Wisconsin 4-H Club or Group to use the 4-H Name and Emblem for educational purposes by laws and regulations established by Congress and the U.S. Department of Agriculture. In addition, the 4-H Charter Application provides:

- Documentation of educational activities of the 4-H Club or Group/Committee needed for liability coverage for 4-H volunteers and members
- Program impact evaluation and educational planning
- Documentation of compliance by 4-H Clubs and Groups with EEO, ADA guidelines, and Civil Rights laws.

Wisconsin 4-H Club and Group Charter Application will be posted on September 1 and must be completed online by November 1.

- <u>2024–2025 Charter Application</u> (online application form) Will open on September 1, 2024
- <u>2024-2025 Printable Charter Worksheet</u>(Printable PDF) a resource you can use with your club or group before completing the online application.
- If you need to submit a paper Charter Application instead of the online version, please contact the Extension office.

Record Books, Due September 1st to the Extension Office

As summer comes to a close it is time to start reflecting on the 2023-2024 4-H year. Record books are part of the reflection process for the 4-H year. Club members can create a record book to reflect on their projects during the year. Visit either the <u>Jackson</u> or <u>Trempealeau</u> County websites to get the pages for your record books. Record books do not have to be in the typical form. Members can use the record book forms for the content then they can put that information into a slideshow, a website, or a different form that they prefer.

Record books will be judged for growth in project areas. Youths should be sure to focus on that with their records.

Re-enrollment for the 4-H Year

The 4-H year is from September 1st to August 31st. Every year members are encouraged to re-enroll in <u>4-H Online</u> to stay connected to the program and get all the proper updates. The soft deadline to enroll is **November 1st.** After this date, the old mailing list will not be used to bother old members who have aged out or are not re-enrolling. Current members should be enrolled and have their projects finalized by **April 1st.**

Enrolling is important. It keeps you and your family included in the great opportunities that 4-H has. It is also an opportunity to update your contact information. Make sure the email address you the the most is used for your family email. This is the one I use for both the 4-H newsletter and the club lists that are shared with leaders.

If you are an adult volunteer be sure you have completed all of the required trainings. <u>Here</u> is a link to the State 4-H website that has all of the trainings and details about them.



Cedar Crest Icecream Flavor Contest

Madison, WI [August 2024] – Cedar Crest Ice Cream, headquartered in Cedarburg, Wisconsin, and the Wisconsin 4-H Foundation have teamed up again to present the "Cedar Crest Ice Cream 4-H Flavor Creation Contest" for Wisconsin 4-H clubs. All Wisconsin 4-H clubs can submit their idea for a new ice cream flavor, along with a flavor description and interesting flavor name. Entries are accepted September 1, 2024, through November 15, 2024.

Five finalists are selected by a panel of Cedar Crest Ice Cream flavor experts from all entries received. One flavor is awarded top honors and a \$500 gift. The winning flavor will make its debut in parlors in the summer of 2025. All five finalists receive an ice cream party for their 4-H club.

"Cedar Crest Ice Cream is known for its variety of flavors," says Robert Kohlwey, Vice President of Sales for Cedar Crest Ice Cream. "It is a real joy to see the imaginative flavor ideas submitted by our creative 4-Hers across the state."

According to Brenda Scheider, Executive Director of the Wisconsin 4-H Foundation, the contest is a great opportunity for 4-H youth to work together to develop and name their flavor. "The most exciting part of the contest is the winning flavor will be available in parlors that scoop Cedar Crest Ice Cream next July."

The contest has been an annual tradition for over ten years. Recent winning flavors of the annual contest include Haystack, created by the Knellsville 4-H Club of Ozaukee County, and Wisconsin Campfire S'mores, created by the Springbrook 4-H Club of New Richmond. The winning flavor for 2024 was Paul Bunyan, created by the Pesobic Pathfinders 4-H Club of Lincoln County. More information and the entry form are available at

The 2024 American Dairy Goat Association (ADGA) Annual Convention will be held this year in Wisconsin! ADGA invites you to join us at the Grand Geneva the week of October 19-25.

Youth are welcome all week at the convention and do not have to be ADGA members to attend. There is a youth-focused program October 19-20. We are actively developing an educational program that connects youth with a passion for dairy goats. Wisconsin 4-H Volunteer and ADGA Member, Rick Shisler from Holmen, said this of last year's youth program "My daughters had such a wonderful time expanding their knowledge in all the great educational sessions. They also made many new friends from around the country, many of whom they still talk with today."

The youth program fee is \$250 if registered by September 18 at 11:59 PM CDT. The fee increases to \$300 until registration closes. August Horse Project Update:

August continues to be a busy month for the horse project members as they move on to compete at State Fairs and District Shows. Jocelyn Perry, who is finishing up her final year of 4-H competed at the Wisconsin State Fair in West Allis on Sunday, August 11 in the Champions Challenge. The Champions' Challenge is by invitation only and is based on your representation at the State Gymkhana, Horse Expo, or State Dressage and Jumper Show the previous year. To further, challenge these youth, you must be in place by 9 am the day before the competition and leave right after the completion of the competition. Jocelyn and her family left home at 2 am on Saturday, August 10th, and returned home at midnight on the 11th. The Champions' Challenge is a team competition and the youth are selected based on, placing, time, score, and judged comments. Horses needed to be in place at 9 am the day before the competition. Jocelyn's team won Grand Champion for the event and Jocelyn personally had five Top 10 finishes.

On Thursday, August 15th, Makayla Nelson traveled to the Twin Cities to compete at the Minnesota State Fair to compete in the Hunter & Jumper Horse Competition. Makayla competed in the 1'6" Hunter and Flat classes on Friday and the 2' classes on Saturday. Makalya came home with three Top 5 placings.

The Trempealeau County 4-H Horse Project hosted the 50th Western District Gymkhana on Saturday, August 17th. Eleven Trempealeau County youth along with youth from Barron, Rusk, La Crosse, Pierce, Jackson, and St. Croix counties competed. Different from state competition, the District Gymkhana is open to grades 3 – 13, with Trempealeau County being represented and placed in each age group. The group ended the day with 18 Top 10 Finishes, 21 Top 5 Finishes, 6 Reserve Grand Champions, and 6 Grand Champions, with Jocelyn Perry winning the high point buckle for the grades 10–13 age group and Emily Young winning it for grades 3 – 5.

To round out the month we had youth competing at the Wisconsin 4-H County Classic in West Salem on August 24th. Anessa Pehler, Halle Fitzmaurice, Paige Braun, & Paizlee Hart all participated in the show and placed in the Top 10 in many of their classes. Highlights from the show, were as follows, Grand Champion Halter for Halle Fitzmaurice which qualified her to compete in the Champion of Champions Halter Class where she also earned Grand Champion as well as a Reserve Championship in Grades 9-13 English Pleasure. Paizlee Hart was named Grand Champion in Grades 3-5 Walk/Trot Trail and Reserve High Point for Grades 6-8 was awarded to Anessa Pehler.

Congratulations everyone and for those attending the State Gymkhana on September 7th and the State Horse Expo, September 13 – 15 best of luck.

Registration for the 2024 Conference is Open!

The conference will be held concurrently with the World Dairy Expo and the National 4-H Dairy Cattle Judging Contest in Madison, Wisconsin, for ease of transportation coordination. Please be aware that National 4-H Dairy Conference delegates may participate in the National 4-H Dairy Cattle Judging Contest, but are not eligible to exhibit cattle at the World Dairy Expo due to time constraints. Also please note that lodging will not be available at the conference site for judging teams due to space limitations.





Fees and Payment: The registration fee for 2024 is \$650/person. This includes lodging from Sunday, September 29 through Wednesday, October 2 (checkout on Thursday morning), most meals, and transportation during the conference. Additional nights may be reserved at the conference hotel on the Registration Summary form. Delegation Coordinators are asked to submit delegate Registration Forms via the online portal by September 11, 2024. All fees must be paid in US currency or an exchange fee will be charged.

Cancellation Policy: All cancellations must be **in writing**. **The late cancellation penalty is** the full registration fee of \$650 per person if the cancellation notice is received after noon CDT on September 11, 2024.

Health and Accident Insurance: Each state and province is responsible for obtaining health and accident insurance for their delegation.

Registration Summary: The Registration Summary and payment are due by **September 11, 2024.** All payment details are in the registration link.

Expectation and Field Trip Forms: These forms are found in the 2024 National 4-H Dairy Conference Handbook. Youth Expectation Statement and Field Trip Authorization forms **must** be submitted for each youth delegate. A youth delegate without a signed form will not be allowed to register on-site. In addition, all adults must submit a signed Adult Expectation Statement. **NOTE: Signed, original Youth and Adult Expectations and Field Trip must be scanned and submitted in the registration portal.**

Registration and Lodging Fee: The registration fee for each youth and adult delegate covers the costs of conducting the conference, lodging for Sunday, Monday, Tuesday, and Wednesday nights, state/province delegation photo, conference pin, bus transportation, recreation, and meals. Participants should contact their state or province coordinator regarding payment arrangements.

Encourage and support all youth, especially your own, to have empathy and concern for others. Show your child, by example, how to cooperate and communicate with those around them.


