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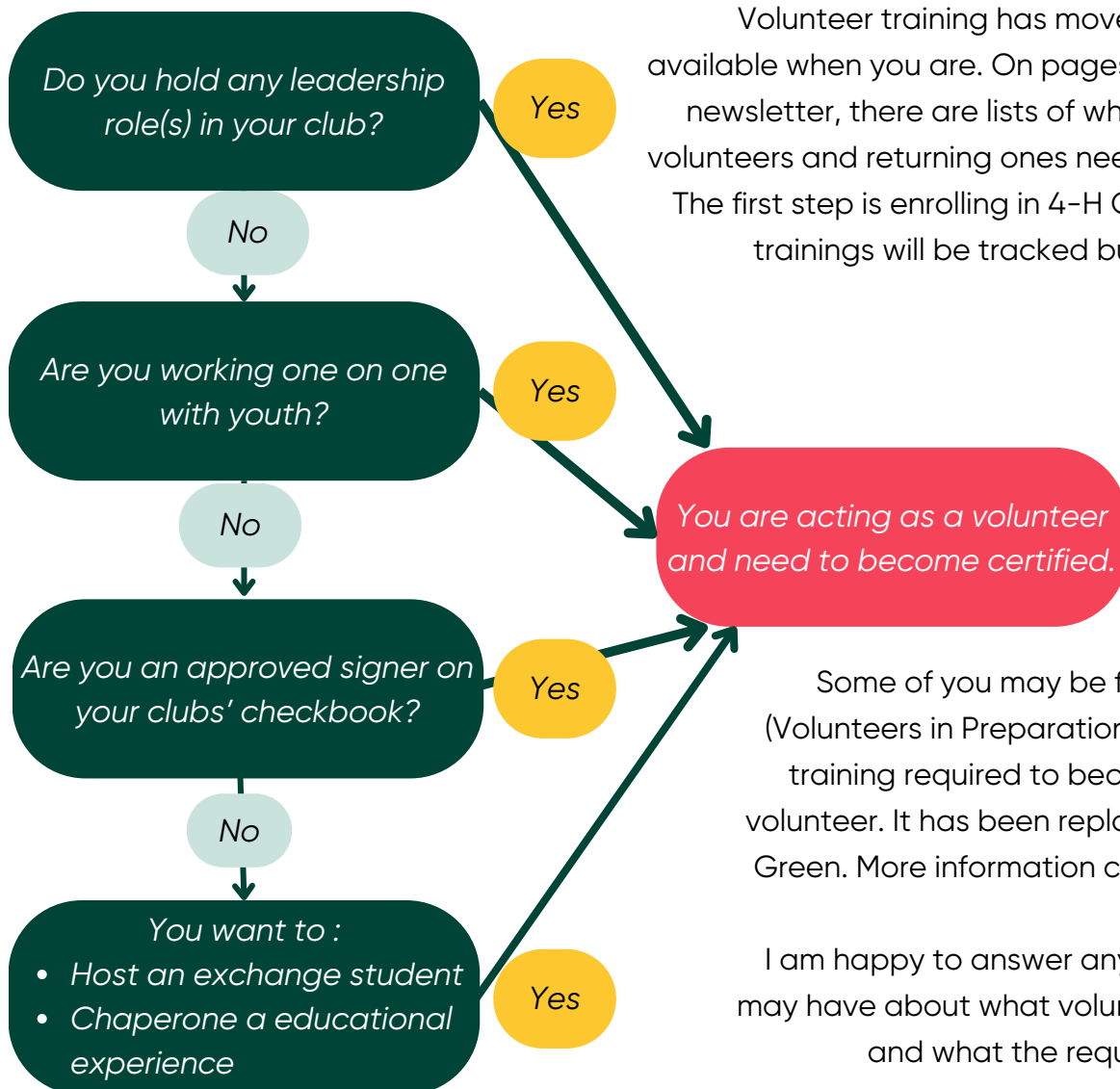
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Club Leader Corner

Am I a volunteer Leader? :

Do you know if you are acting as a 4-H volunteer and need to start training to become a certified volunteer? Look at the decision chart below to help determine if you are acting in the role of a volunteer. If you answered yes to any of these questions you are on track to be a volunteer and should enroll as a volunteer in 4-H Online and start training.



Volunteer training has moved online and is available when you are. On pages 4 and 5 of the newsletter, there are lists of what training new volunteers and returning ones need to complete. The first step is enrolling in 4-H Online as all the trainings will be tracked but they are also available.

Some of you may be familiar with VIP (Volunteers in Preparation) the in-person training required to become a certified volunteer. It has been replaced with Grow Green. More information can be found on page 3.

I am happy to answer any questions you may have about what volunteering means and what the requirements are.

Fall Club Visits

I am opening up my calendar to fall club visits! I plan to visit each club and project group during the fall and winter months. Here is a list of programming options that I can bring to the meetings:

- Bylaw Review
 - Time: 2 hours
 - Youth leaders review the current club bylaws and help shape them to the current needs of the club.
- Officer Training
 - Time: 40 minutes
 - Officer training for new and current officers. This can happen before a club meeting. Topics covered would be job responsibilities, parliamentary procedure, and how to run a meeting.
- Get to Know you Activities
 - Time: 20 minutes- 1 hour
 - These activities can take as much time as you want. I will bring activities that can be added to any meeting to help club members get to know other club members.
- Team Building
 - Time: 20 minutes - 1 hour
 - These activities can help your officer team build better connections and work together. The whole club can participate too!

New Family Handbook

With the start of the new 4-H year, new families are joining our groups. Here is a resource: the New Family Handbook. This handbook has everything new members and families need to get a great start in our program. Copies will be mailed out to club leaders in October for any new members.

The handbook includes:

- A general calendar of when to expect specific programs throughout the year.
- 4-H terminology to help explain different parts of the program.
- How to stay connected.
- Policies and what they mean for members.

Financial Policy Updates

With the start of a new 4-H year keeping up with [financial policies](#) will start your club off on the right foot. Some of the policies you should pay attention to are:

- Bank Accounts and Online Payments Systems
- Membership Dues and Participation Fees
- and Planning and Fundraising

The Online Payments Systems has updated so if your club used PayPal, Venmo, or Zelle you can not use personal accounts. You will have to open an account that can go directly into the club account.



Re-enrollment for the 4-H Year

The 4-H year runs from September 1st to August 31st. Each year, members are encouraged to re-enroll in 4-H Online to stay connected and receive updates.

Important Dates:

- **Soft Deadline:** November 1st. After this date, the old mailing list will be discontinued to avoid contacting members who have aged out or are not re-enrolling.
- **Final Enrollment and Project Deadline:** April 1st. Current members should be enrolled and have their projects finalized by this date.

Why Enroll?

- **Stay Connected:** Ensure you and your family remain part of the great opportunities 4-H offers.
- **Update Information:** Use this opportunity to update your contact information. Make sure to use the email address you check most frequently for your family email. This email will be used for the 4-H newsletter and club lists shared with leaders.

For Adult Volunteers:

- Ensure you have completed all required training. Visit the [State 4-H website](#) for training details and requirements.

- § Any media may be used: paint, crayon, colored pencil, charcoal, stickers, paper or other materials on regular posters. (Computer-generated posters will not be accepted)
- § To be eligible for judging, each entry must have a completed and signed entry form attached to back.

Charter Applications are now Open

The 4-H Charter indicates that a 4-H Club or Group is organized by the objectives of the Wisconsin 4-H program. The University of Wisconsin-Madison, Division of Extension grants 4-H Charters which formally authorizes a Wisconsin 4-H Club or Group to use the 4-H Name and Emblem for educational purposes by laws and regulations established by Congress and the U.S. Department of Agriculture. In addition, the 4-H Charter Application provides:

- Documentation of educational activities of the 4-H Club or Group/Committee needed for liability coverage for 4-H volunteers and members
- Program impact evaluation and educational planning
- Documentation of compliance by 4-H Clubs and Groups with EEO, ADA guidelines, and Civil Rights laws.

Wisconsin 4-H Club and Group Charter Application will be posted on September 1 and must be completed online by November 1.

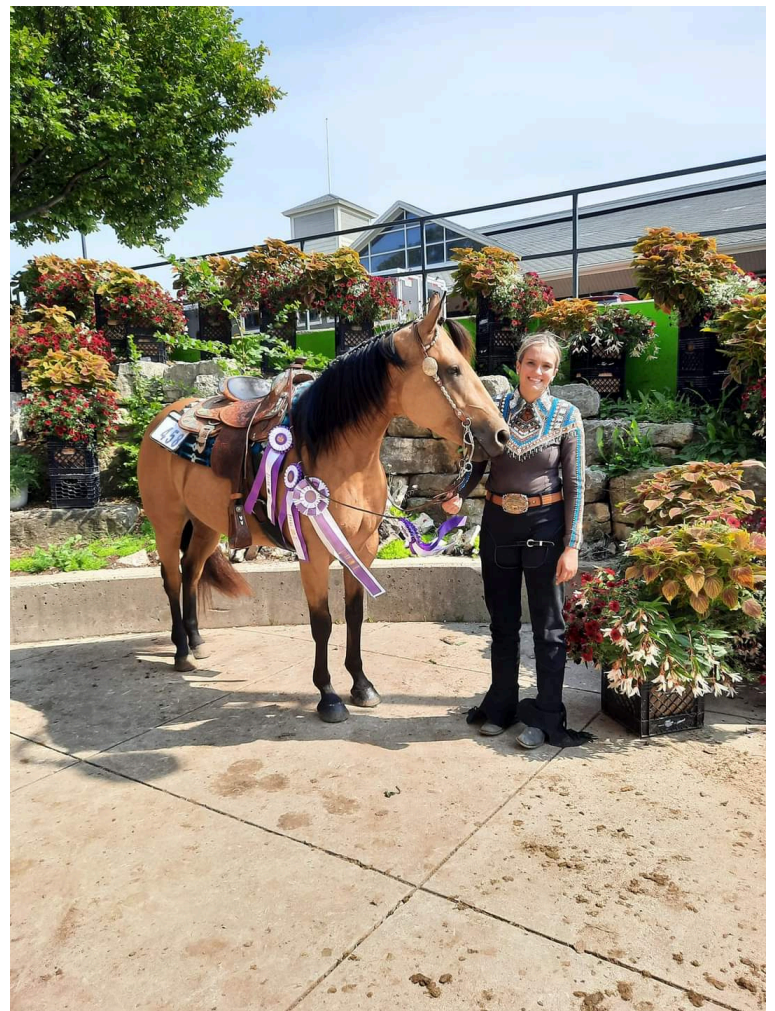


Horse Project Updates:

The 4-H Horse shows wrapped up in September with the State Gymkhana on September 7th and State Horse Expo on September 14th.

The State Gymkhana saw two Trempealeau County Horse Project members make their way to West Allis to compete. Jocelyn Perry attended her last State Gymkhana and Madison Grotjahn, daughter of Derik & Jessica, competed at her first. Jocelyn and Chance competed in all 6 events, earning two Top 10s, three Top 10's, and Reserve Champions in the Flag Race. Madison and Reno, earned two Top 10's and four Top 5's.

Halle Fitzmaurice, daughter of Doyle and Dawn, competed at the State Expo the following weekend with her mare, Two-Eyed Ivory Lena. They competed in English, Western, Trail, and Showmanship. With a busy schedule showing all three days, Halle and Lena were awarded five Top 10's and Reserve Champions in English Showmanship.

As the 4-H new year is starting back up again here is a reminder about all of the cool travel programs that the state 4-H Program has to offer. Here is a short list of some popular programs that your child should definitely look into. Below is a link to the State Website so you can explore these opportunities more.

American Spirit:

Who can go: youth in grades 8-10

Cost \$1,900

Youth get to experience historical sights on the East Coast firsthand! This 10-day bus journey will stop at some amazing places like Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, New York, New York, Boston, Massachusetts, and Niagara Falls Canada!

Citizenship Washington Focus: Who can go: 4-H Members in 10-12th grades Minimum age 15 during the experience Cost \$1750 Citizen Washington Focus or CWF is a great opportunity for youth who want to experience our national government in action. Youth from all over the nation come together in Washington D.C. to learn more about our Senators and representatives and how they come together to make laws. They will also participate in workshops about citizenship, Congressional Issues, Bill writing, and Action Planning.



National 4-H Conference

Who can go: 8-10 4-H youth in 10-12th grade.

Cost \$1,500

This Educational experience included selected youth from the nation who came together in Washington D.C. to help strengthen the national 4-H program. Ideas that come from this program are shared with the U.S. Secretary of Agriculture after each conference.

Space Camp Who can go: 6-8th Grades with a Maximum age of 15 at the time of the trip. Cost \$900 This educational Experience is out of this world! Participants get to experience a simulated Space Mission, building and launching their own rocket, accommodations simulating real space training experience, and learning all about space exploration and astronaut life.

Summer Academy


Who can go: 7-up Grades

Cost \$350

Formally Wisconsin Youth Conference, this educational experience is held at UW-Madison during June. The difference between this and the youth conference is the focus on post-secondary education. Youth pick one of 7 tracks to explore during the experience like Agriculture & animal sciences, Art and communication, Culinary and health, Human Services, Leadership and Civic Engagement, Trades, and STEM(Science, Technology, Engineering, and math).



Travel Abroad Who can go: Age 12-18 depending on the country. The cost depends on the program. Youth can experience different countries and cultures. Here are some of the places you can explore, Costa Rica, Japan (4-8 weeks), South Korea, and Taiwan. Countries are on a rotating cycle and change every couple of years.



Art Beat Who can go: 3-5th Grades, parents welcome. Cost \$125 for youth, \$75 for Chaperones **4-H Art Beat** is the introductory program for Wisconsin 4-H Communication Arts and was created for 4-H members in grades 3-5, their parents, and leaders. Art Beat! provides an opportunity for youth and their parents to experience five different art forms in a camping environment at Camp Upham Woods in Wisconsin Dells. Art Beat! track leaders are older 4-H Youth, 4-H Leaders, and staff.

Arts Camp

Who can go: 6-8th Grades

Cost \$100 Youth \$55 Chaperones

4-H Arts Camp provides youth in grades 6-8 an opportunity to explore different types of art including theater, music, visual arts, dance, and photography while making new friends, developing skills, and enjoying new experiences.

The purpose of Arts Camp:

- Encouraging expression and participation in the arts with middle school-age youth
- Supporting youth teaching opportunities where they learn to incorporate education, creativity, and reflection on the creative process
- Increasing awareness of the arts and participation in the arts at the club level

Fall Forum

Who can go: 7-13th Grade and adult chaperones.

The cost depends on how you spend the night and how many meals you will eat.

4-H Projects

4-H engages youth in project-based education. Through project learning, youth can dive deeper into their interests and passions, ultimately mastering new skills. 4-H projects are meant to be hands-on to create a memorable learning experience.

What is a project?

A project is simply a topic area that sparks a youth's interest! Projects can be offered at a club or group setting, or on your own outside of the club. 4-H members are encouraged to enroll in only one or two projects for their first year. 4-H members in 3rd grade and higher are eligible to sign up for any 4-H project. Almost all 4-H projects can be divided into these nine broad project areas:

- Animal Sciences
- Arts & Communication
- Community Involvement
- Cultural Projects
- Family, Home, & Health
- Outdoor Education (Natural Sciences)
- Plant & Soil Sciences
- STEM
- Start Your Own

A tenth project area is specifically for grades K-2, known as Cloverbuds. It is intended to be more developmentally appropriate for our youngest members.

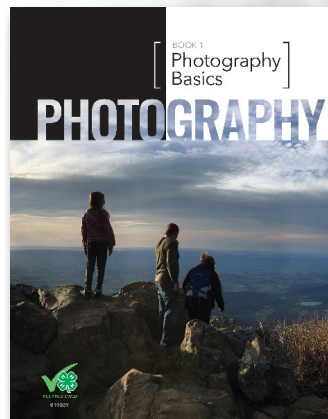

What resources are available?

Each county's 4-H program differs in how project learning opportunities are offered. Some programs offer countywide, short-term workshops. Others may have countywide programs with set dates and meeting locations. Some 4-H clubs may have adults specifically devoted to certain project areas.

What if my county or club doesn't offer a project?

Anywhere can be a great place for project learning where a trusted adult or older youth serves as the teacher. Project curriculum is available for many of the projects from shop4-h.org or your local Extension office.



What is a project leader?

Project leaders provide a safe environment to learn about a project area in which they have experience. Adults can volunteer as a project leader to share their specialized skill set with youth!
